this is not an atlas

by Jude Abu Zaineh, Bonnie Devine, Bruno Canadien, Maria Hupfield, Teo Monsalve, Su Yu Hsin, Joseph Tisiga

Curated by Noor Alé January 9 - March 26, 2022



this is not an atlas examines notions of mapping, mythologies, and belonging in the works of artists Jude Abu Zaineh, Bruno Canadien, Bonnie Devine, Maria Hupfield, Teo Monsalve, Su Yu Hsin, and Joseph Tisiga. The gathered works—among them site-specific installations, prints, video and paintings —make visible the histories and realities of sovereignty and resilience by remapping, reorienting, and reclaiming cartography as a decolonial practice.

Cartography charted the expansion of European empires into the Americas, Africa, and Asia, fuelling the forced expropriation of Indigenous lands. Authored by surveyors, maps are neither neutral nor objective; they serve as ideological tools articulating power hierarchies, economic motivations, and nationalistic agendas. The exhibition's title is borrowed from a global collection of counter-cartographic writings by artists, environmentalists, and scholars who create maps to engender political activism.



prayers for a word (or a lack that builds the world)

Joshua Vettivelu

Curated by Matthew Kyba and Megan Kammerer February 4 - March 6, 2022 Public Program: Artist Led tour and talk, March 5, 2022.



Joshua Vettivelu's installation, *prayers for a word (or a lack that builds the world)* presents hundreds of slowly melting castings of their grandmother's hands, made out of beeswax infused with 'Ceylon' cinnamon.

Vettivelu's research investigates how the language we use to understand ourselves is informed by the material conditions that surround us. *Prayers for a word (a lack that builds the world)* connects the material history of the spice trade with the psychic impact of European missionary work to explore how frameworks of redemption and salvation have been used to ensure enthusiastic labour and unfettered access to resources.

The installation is housed in the VAC, recalling its role as a decommissioned



barley mill. The building was constructed in 1905 for the processing of grits and barley, later revitalized into a hub of cultural production by the Town of Newcastle in 1976. In collaboration with Nicolas Fleming and Andreas Buchwaldt, Vettivelu refigures the VAC's architecture into a factory that continually produces and destroys something that is simultaneously material and immaterial, public yet deeply private.

yesterday is melting

Works by Sandy Williams IV Featuring ANTIESTABLISHED, Mariana Parisca, Monsieur Zohore

Co-Curated by Matthew Kyba and Megan Kammerer April 1 - May 28, 2022 Public Program: Artist Talk, May 28, 2022



Yesterday is Melting encapsulates a relentless pursuit of public agency and free will in the face of colonial institutions. governmental power, and increasing social amnesia. Sandy Williams IV implicates audiences to acknowledge how we observe and participate in history. From the reconceptualization of public monuments to the unspoken implications of unattended luggage or the sociopolitical index captured in currency, Williams strikes a balance in tension. They interplay the untouchable and the malleable, the passage of time and the infallible memory, the transparent and the concealed to encourage the viewer's participation in history-making.

Additional works by ANTIESTABLISHED (Kate Turner, Warren Jones, and Williams), Mariana Parisca, and Monsieur Zohore respond to Williams' engagement in the emancipation of public space. Together their disparate works unravel common structures of power and repression in the Americas.



Sutures

by Eve Tagny and Emii Alrai

Curated by Matthew Kyba and Megan Kammerer July 3 - September 4, 2022 Public Program: Artist Talk July 3, 2022



In their first collaborative exhibition, Eve Tagny and Emii Alrai bring together an accumulation of sculptural gestures which reference a two-year digital research process. These gestures are placed in the gallery as a visual essay, layering relationships between land, extraction, and the body.

After injury, a suture weaves broken pieces back into a whole. Its bands pull together, forcing two lacerations to meet as the body recovers from incision. The works in this exhibition take the form of stitches—physical and photographic assemblages which together create a scarred landscape. Traditional techniques of cob mortor, hand-dyed textile, and clay are blended with new experimentation in bio-plastics and construction materials to create a terrain that desires time to heal itself from the extractive binds which the non-white body undergoes in a landscape.


The duo met on Instagram—one based in Montréal and the other in Leeds. They wove individual research practices together online from across the Atlantic. Digital collaborations later developed into physical meetings in England, Italy, and Canada—ultimately landing on the common structures that tie these landscapes together. Tagny and Alrai traveled to Clarington for a month-long residency in June 2022. They stitched together dueling notions of a wound in our studiosactivating ceramics, photography, and found objects to uncover the history of these materials as they transform into new barriers and skins.

Artist Opportunities

41st Juried Art Exhibition October 1 - December 14 Awards Reception: Saturday, October 15, 6 - 9 pm

Following our call to artists in August 2022, the VAC received over 180 individual submissions. Narrowing selections from the incredible variety and quality of entries was a great challenge. Originality, ability, and technique were the primary criteria used to select the final 35 artists over 2 categories—Adult and Youth. This exhibition showcases varied artmaking techniques and subject matter from artists working in painting, photography, drawing, sculpture, and video art. Eight cash prizes are awarded between these groups, including six juried Excellence Prizes and two People's Choice Awards.





Open Call for Public Art: Toyota Eastern Canada Parts Distribution Centre

After sharing an open call to Ontario-based artists and art collectives in March, the VAC is happy to say that Toyota Canada has recently unveiled their new public art piece, *Momentum*. This vibrant red sculpture was created by multi-disciplinary Canadian artist Niall McClelland. *Momentum* reflects on Toyota's core principles of respect for people and the environment, as well as their commitment to social progress.

Driftwood Theatre Group is excited to announce plans for their return to the road with The Bard's Bus Tour. Back for the first time since 2019, Driftwood will present *King Henry Five*, running throughout Southern Ontario from July 14 - August 21, 2022. An ambitious adaptation of three Shakespeare plays (*Henry IV* pts 1 & 2, *Henry V*), *King Henry Five* is a powerful story about community, the families we inherit and those we choose, and the legacies we leave behind.

Set against the backdrop of a contemporary patio bar and featuring Driftwood's signature blend of music, puppetry and Shakespeare's captivating poetry, *King Henry Five* rolls into outdoor community spaces across Ontario this summer. This compelling saga will be told with a cast of only five performers. Led by Driftwood's Founding Artistic Director, Jeremy Smith the cast includes celebrated Canadian theatre veteran Hume Baugh, Richard Alan Campbell, Ximena Huizi and emerging theatre artists Rosalie Tremblay and Ben Yoganathan. Incubator Workshop Series



We need to speak in spores A Participatory performance by Emily DiCarlo Saturday, August 27, 2022 We need to speak in spores is a collective exercise in attunement, empathy and collaboration where the public is invited to think like fungi.





Saprotrophs—A screening with artist Miles Rufeld Saturday, August 27, 2022

Saprotrophs is a hybrid screening and lecture event to be presented at the VAC, focused on historicizing ideas of growth and decay, as they've evolved from the earth's ancient ecologies to landscapes of industrialized capitalism. The event will open with a screening of artist Miles Rufelds' 2019 essay film, *Two or Three Saprophytes*.

A Virtual Meeting Friday, September 9, 2022

August Klintberg leads a virtual discussion studying the phenomenon of artist-run restaurants—the subject of his Ph.D. thesis and a remaining area of ongoing research in his practice. Klintberg's selected case studies use food and hospitality as leverage points to highlight commodity exchange, to enact activism, to question or claim forms of identity, and to spark conviviality.



Into the Mire: Foraging New Ethics in the Soper Creek Valley Led by Artist Maria Simmons Saturday, December 10, 2022



A nature walk venturing out into Soper Creek Valley. Hybrid artist Maria Simmons lead participants through the landscape, introducing the present ecology, fungal structures and basic floral identification techniques. Participants learned about current foraging practices as they investigated the anaerobic underworlds of Canadian Peatlands. Participants co-produced living sculptures with Simmons as they used a collection of the vegetation gathered during this event to create active bog fermentations in their upcoming exhibition, *Anoxic Memory*.
